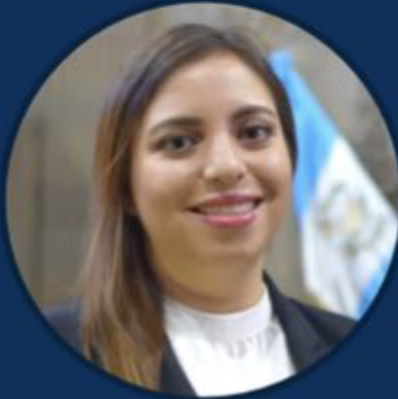
ETIENE MARTINS
BRAZIL

Etiene Martins is a federal judge in Brazil. Prior to his judicial appointment in 2014, he served as a police officer in Rio de Janeiro for 16 years. As a judge, he has presided over civil and criminal cases that have covered various facets of law, including free speech, civil rights, and political corruption. He has also promoted criminal justice reform while training judges and court staff on sentencing topics at the Judicial College and advancing restorative justice programs in Brazilian federal courts. Etiene's connections with Rio de Janeiro's police department have allowed him to introduce conflict resolution strategies into the police academy curriculum. His conflict resolution initiatives have helped police officers act as peacebuilders and bridge the gap between police and communities. He holds an LL.M. degree from Harvard Law School. He has been a judicial fellow at the U.S. Federal Judicial Center and a senior fellow at the Weinstein International Foundation. Etiene's key leadership strengths are self-awareness, passion for serving others, and Christian-based values. The belief in a just, democratic, and peaceful Brazil is the foundation of his work in the judiciary and police.



RAQUEL GRŪNAUER
ECUADOR

Raquel Grūnauer Espinoza has a master's degree in international sciences and diplomacy from the Instituto de Diplomacia Antonio Parra Velasco, a master's degree in PMP from the Universidad de la Rioja, and degree in international business management from the Universidad T cnica Federico Santa Mar a. At the completion of her university studies, she was awarded a scholarship by the National Polytechnic of Jakarta where she studied Indonesian language and culture. She was an intern at the Organization of American States (OAS) in the Competitiveness, Innovation and Technology section of the Executive Secretariat for Integral Development (SEDI). She currently works as head of office and advisor at the Andean Parliament, Ecuador office. She worked in the National Assembly of Ecuador as an advisor to the National Assemblywoman for the Social Christian Party, Cristina Reyes Hidalgo. In addition to her work in the legislative body, Raquel works as program coordinator for Fundaci n Destino Libertad, where she is dedicated to organizing and managing activities for vulnerable groups such as women and in training and leadership development for youth and women. She is currently the executive director for the Youngster Branch of the PSC in Ecuador, and was a part of the 2020 Cohort of the program for Latin-American Leaders of Pablo VI Foundation in Spain.



ANDREA VILLAGRÁN
GUATEMALA

Andrea Villagrán has served as a member of the Parliament of the Republic of Guatemala since 2017. The youngest congresswoman in Guatemala, she is currently in her second term, having been reelected in 2020. Andrea is a member of the commissions for women, foreign relations, electoral reforms, small and medium-sized enterprises, and Vice-President of the Youth Commission. She has stood for a legislative agenda in favor of the fight against corruption and the strengthening of democracy. She has held an active role in favor of the rights of women and youth, and was nominated for the One Young World Politician of the Year Award in 2022. She holds a degree in political science from the Rafael Landívar University of Guatemala, and earned a specialization in Decentralized Cooperation from the Observatory of Decentralized Cooperation of the European Union and Latin America. She is now completing her master's degree in public administration. In 2013, she was elected President of the Faculty of Political Sciences.



JEAN EDWIGE PETIT-FRÈRE
HAITI

Jean Edwige Petit-Frère was born, raised, and college-educated in Gonaïves, Haiti. After his studies, he became a high school teacher, teaching history and geography to 12th grade students. As a teacher, he was interested not only in the subjects he taught, but in his students' minds and personalities. He has also worked as Civil Servant at the Haitian Prime Minister's Office as State Administrator, as an intern at the Global Research Forum on Diaspora and Transnationalism (GRFT), and at the Organization of American States (OAS). Today, Jean Edwige is a consultant at the United Nations Development Programme. He is also a co-founder of the HAITI Migration Group, an organization whose mission is to contribute to better migration policy development in Haiti. Jean has a master's degree in international migration. In his spare time, he loves to cook and learn about different cultures.



NATE KING
USA

Nate King serves as national director of U.S. advocacy at International Justice Mission (IJM), a global organization that partners with local authorities to protect people in poverty from violence. IJM works through 24 program offices in 14 countries to rescue and restore victims, hold perpetrators accountable, and help strengthen public justice systems. Nate leads IJM's strategic engagement with the U.S. Congress, working with legislators and their staff to shape U.S. efforts to combat human trafficking and violence against women and children (VAWC) through legislation and funding mechanisms. Prior to his current role, Nate led IJM's grassroots advocacy and mobilization programs on the regional and national levels in the U.S. Before joining IJM, he worked in public engagement at Lutheran World Relief, an international NGO focused on sustainable development and disaster relief. Earlier in his career, Nate served as a public policy and advocacy fellow at Lutheran Services in America and as an intern in the White House Office of Presidential Correspondence. Nate received a B.A. from Valparaiso University, where he graduated with honors as a Christ College Scholar. Nate and his wife, Lacy, live in the Washington, D.C. area.
